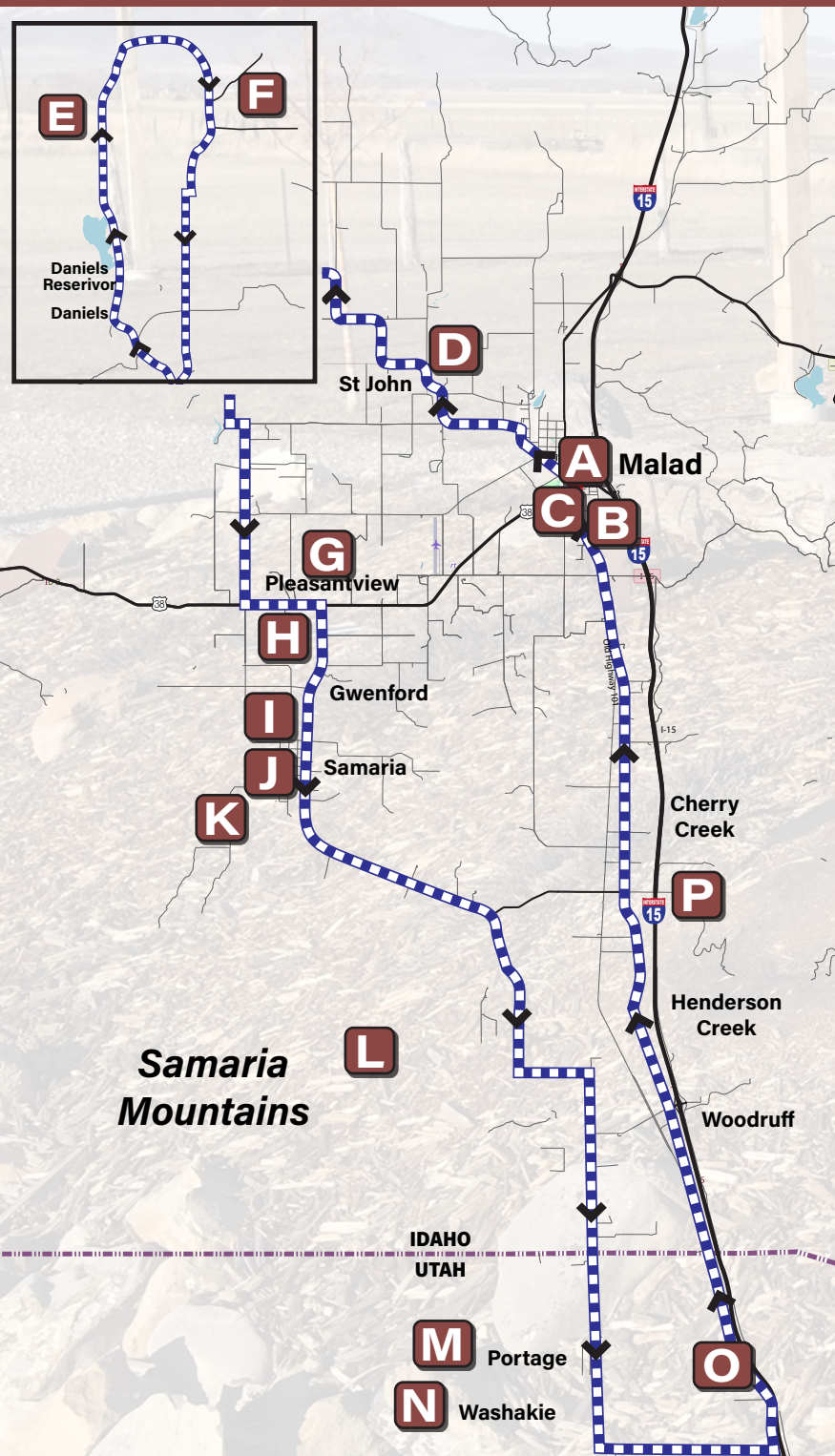


Malad Valley Historic Driving Loop

Malad Valley Historic Driving Loop

This historic route begins in Malad, west on Bannock Street, historically known as “Gold Road” because this was the route bringing gold from Bannock, Montana to Salt Lake City. It then travels north through St. John on N. 1000 W. and Daniels on Daniels Road (about 20 minutes from Malad, then commences south through Pleasantview (on Sublette Canyon Road) to State Hwy. 36, then jots south to Samaria on Samaria Road, to Old Hwy. 191 to Portage and nearby Washakie. Finally, it heads north along Old Hwy. 191 through Woodruff and Cherry Creek before concluding back where we started in Malad. The complete loop can be easily driven in a couple of hours’ time, or can be made into a nice day-trip as you visit the sites

 - Old-fashioned General Store, operated since early 1900s

 - Homes & buildings on National Register of Historic Sites

- Washakie Town site- home of North Western Band of Shoshone Nations after Bear River Massacre
